#### RESPITE SERVICES

Respite services exist to provide caregivers temporary relief or rest from caregiving activities. Respite care may be provided for a few hours a week in the home, or through a temporary stay in an assisted living home. Services are provided on a cost-sharing basis determined by income and ability to pay. To qualify, the caregiver must live with the care recipient. Two types of groups are offered: Educational support groups meet for 2 hours, once a week, for 8 weeks. Drop-in support groups are ongoing, open to all, and meet once or twice a month for  $1 - 1\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

### Respite Program

#### WHY RESPITE?

In the U.S. today, nearly one out of every five homes is involved in caregiving to persons aged 60 or over. This means that about 25 million people are caregivers. Caregiving responsibilities can sometimes cause caregiver exhaustion, stress, depression and ill health. Respite services exist to provide a break, a time of renewal and an opportunity to reclaim personal time for caregivers.

#### The goals of respite programs are:

- 1. To prevent caregiver "burnout"
- 2. To support the integrity of the family unit
- 3. To delay institutionalization as long as possible.

#### THE RESPITE PROGRAM

Funded by the Older Americans Act of Congress, the PHS Respite Program is designed so that caregivers can take time off. We provide short-term respite care arrangements for individuals 60 and older who are living with their unpaid, family caregivers. Priority is given to individuals who demonstrate economic and social need for services. Respite services are provided on a sliding fee scale (based on care recipient income) and families are asked to cost-share for services.

#### TYPES OF RESPITE

The Respite Program provides two basic types of service:

- IN-HOME RESPITE: The Case Manager will meet with the family to assess needs, and then will make arrangements for regular, ongoing, at-home respite care (Hours vary depending on family needs).
- FACILITY RESPITE: The Case Manager will meet with the family to assess needs, and then will make arrangements with contracted facilities for short-term overnight placement of the care recipient (typically one week stay in an Skilled Nursing Facility).

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

- Pima County residents.
- Care recipients who are 60 years or older.
- Families demonstrating economic and social need.

#### General Information:

The PHS-Community Services System (CSS) is a coordinated delivery system that provides home and community based services to low-income frail elderly and younger physically disabled members of our community who are at risk of not meeting their daily living needs. The services through the program are intended to keep individuals living independently for as long as possible, while helping to ensure their health and well-being.

The Community Services System is a non-entitlement program which is funded through a combination of grants. Funding to support the CSS is provided, in whole or in part, by Pima County, the Administration on Aging and the Arizona Department of Economic Security-Division of Aging and Adult Services, Pima Council on Aging, and individual contributions.

#### **Eligibility**:

Due to limited funding, services are targeted to those individuals who have the greatest need, both socially and economically, and who are most unable to pay. Eligibility is prescreened by the CSS Central Intake Unit when a client, family member or agency makes a referral to the system.

#### Referrals

The CSS utilizes a centralized Intake Unit located at Pima Council on Aging (PCOA). The intake specialists assist callers with information, resources and conduct appropriate screening for the CSS. If eligible, potential clients will be referred to one of the four case management agencies listed below for an in-home assessment.

The CSS centralized intake number is **790-7262**.

There are four agencies in the County that provide case management. Case Managers act as client advocates. They are responsible for assessing eligibility, determining clients' needs, authorizing and coordinating services and performing ongoing monitoring of the service plan.

#### Our Mission

Founded in 1985, the mission of Interfaith Community Services (formerly Northwest Interfaith Center) is:

To live our diverse faiths by helping seniors, disabled individuals and people in financial crisis in Pima County achieve stable and independent lives through support from volunteers, faith communities and the community at large.

### The Need for our Services Continues To Increase...

#### The growing senior population

There are 119,000 seniors age 65+ and this number is increasing yearly. Overall, 41% of local seniors have disabilities, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. The population age 85+ is expected to double by 2015 and the need for assistance increases with advancing age.

#### Working families in financial crisis

A high percentage of working poor families do not qualify for public healthcare and do not benefit from employer-paid health plans. 17.7% of the people in Pima County live below the federal poverty level. A majority of the households served by ICS pay most of their income for rent and utilities, leaving little for healthcare or other basic needs.

#### Caregiving Services

**Transportation / Shopping.** This is the most requested of all our caregiving services. Volunteers use their personal vehicles to provide round trip transportation to medical appointments, banks, the post office, or grocery stores.

Reassurance Calls / Telecare. Caring Telecare volunteers make daily reassurance phone calls to check on the safety and well being of homebound neighbors. These calls help us determine if the individual is well and functioning.

**Friendly Visiting / Friendly Phoning.** Friendly visits and phoning are provided regularly to others to help overcome isolation.

Caregiver Relief. This service provides short-term relief to a caregiver (usually a family member) so they may leave the home. **Handy Helpers.** Volunteers do minor home repairs for elderly or disabled recipients. Recipients pay for materials.

**Business Help.** Volunteers assist in managing personal business, paying bills, and handling personal correspondence of recipients.

Health Advocacy. Staffed by a registered nurse, this program provides health education, health counseling, and assistance in connecting with needed community resources. This service is available to registered ICS recipients and member faith communities and extended to the community-at-large depending on staff availability.

#### **Hospital-Based Services**

#### **Bedside Support Volunteers**

Volunteers provide support to older patients and their family members to help minimize the disruptive nature of illness and maximize recovery.

#### **Pet Therapy**

Pet therapy is beneficial for patients recovering from illness or injury, especially those experiencing confusion, frustration, fear or loneliness.

#### **Post Hospital Services**

A professional geriatric specialist offers follow-up support, helps assess ongoing needs at home, and offers emotional support and assistance to promote recovery once discharged from the hospital.

#### **Critical Decisions – Advance Directives**

Advance Directives are legal documents to assist you in making health care decisions in advance and can include living wills, medical powers of attorney, and pre-hospital medical directives. The purpose is to let others know about and honor your wishes regarding end of life, or treatments choices.

#### □ Support Groups

Support groups are held in may locations throughout Southern Arizona to meet the needs of persons diagnosed with dementia, their caregivers, families and friends. Specialized support groups for newly diagnosed individuals, spouses, children and non-family caregivers are also available. Support groups provide educational information, resources and support in a non-judgmental and confidential setting.

#### □ Helpline (informational and Referral)

Information is available on a variety of topics. Some of these include diagnosis, legal and financial planning, types of dementia, stages of the disease progression, coping with challenging behaviors and medical research. This information and emotional support for caregiver is available by phoning (520) 322-6601 or (800) 272-3900 - outside of Pima County. Information kits are provided upon request. You may also give your name, address, etc. to receive the quarterly Chapter newsletter.

#### ☐ Care Planning and Family Consultation

Assistance with planning, emotional support and educational information is available by appointment at our office or by telephone. These appointments are confidential and are provided by qualified professionals.

#### □ Orientation Meetings

Call our office at 520-322-6601 to schedule a personalized orientation meeting. Orientations provide an introduction and overview of Alzheimer's disease, the services provided by the Alzheimer's Association Desert Southwest Chapter and community resource information is presented.

#### ☐ Safe Return- Medic Alert (Wanderer's Identification Program)

This program is the only nationwide system designed to help identify, locate and return to safety those individuals who are memory impaired due to Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder. Safe Return provides identification products for the memory impaired person and the caregiver, a 24- hour toll-free number, registration in a national database, access to 17,000 law enforcement agencies, and connection to over 80 Alzheimer's Association chapters around the country. Memory impaired individuals may be registered in this program by calling 1-888-572-8566. There is a fee of \$49.00 for this service, with an annual administrative fee of \$20 per year. Scholarships are available in Southern Arizona for low-income individuals.

#### □ Education

The latest information about Alzheimer's disease and related disorders is available to the community through conferences, workshops, publications, community forums, and training sessions. Several times during the year the Chapter hosts meeting on various subjects which have included current clinical research, caring for the caregiver, and legal and financial planning. A speaker's Bureau is available to address civic, religious & business audience of all sizes. Modest fees are charged for some of the conferences, workshops and professional training.

#### □ Resource Library

Books, videos and other materials are available for loan from the Southern Arizona office library. Additional resource materials are available for use at the office.


#### □ Advocacy
